Seizure Response		Basic Seizure First Aid: <u>Tonic-Clonic</u> Note time at beginning/end of event Position person on side Do not put anything in mouth Cushion head, clear area Stay with student until fully conscious <u>All other seizures:</u> Note length of seizure (s) Prevent student from injury Do not grab or shout at person Stay with student until fully aware

Post-seizure recovery measures:		A seizure is generally considered an emergency when: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Convulsive (tonic-clonic) seizure lasts longer than 5 minutes • Child has repeated seizures without regaining consciousness • Child is injured or has diabetes • Child has a first-time seizure • Child has breathing difficulties • Child has a seizure in water
